Session 1: learning to learn

HOW TO BE A GOOD LANGUAGE LEARNER

- Think about your learning style (= how you are learning) and find out what works best for you and what doesn't.
- Take risks! Try out different ways of learning to find what works best!
- Don't be afraid of making mistakes! Learn from them!
- Be realistic! Learning takes time and effort.

HOW TO BE A GOOD LANGUAGE LEARNER

- Be independent! Don't count on your teacher for everything
- Be organised and active! Always look for opportunities to develop your language inside and outside of the classroom.
- Be concerned about communication and accuracy (= correctness)

WHAT IS YOUR LEARNING STYLE?



You are a visual learner if:

- you learn through seeing.
- it is important for you to see the teacher's body language and facial expression to better understand the lesson.
- you prefer to take detailed notes and you like to learn from visual displays such as illustrated text books, diagrams, hand-. outs

WHAT IS YOUR LEARNING STYLE?



You are an auditory learner if ...

- you learn through listening to what others have to say, verbal lectures, discussions, talking things through.
- You interpret the meanings of speech through listening to tone of voice, pitch, speed and other nuances.

WHAT IS YOUR LEARNING STYLE?



You are a tactile /kinesthetic learner if ...

- you learn through moving, doing and touching.
- You need activity and exploration and you may find it hard to sit still for long periods and may become distracted.

PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS

- Use visual materials (pictures, charts, maps, graphs etc...)
- Have a clear view of your teachers when they are speaking (body language and expression)
- Use colour to higlight certain points in texts
- Take notes, ask you teacher to provide handouts
- Illustrate your ideas as a picture or brainstorming bubble (before writing them down)
- Write a story and illustrate it
- Use multi-media
- Study in a quiet place
- Read illustrated books
- Visualize information as a picture



PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS

- Take part in class discussions and debates
- Make speeches and presentations
- Use your MP3 or cell phone when you are at home to record lessons and vocabulary and memorize through listening and testing
- Read text out aloud
- Discuss your ideas verbally



PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS

- Take frequent study breaks
- Move around to learn new things
- Work at a standing position
- Chew gum while studying at home (not in class!!!)
- Use bright colours to highlight reading material
- If you wish listen to music while you study
- Skim through reading material (*lisez en diagonales*) to get a general idea before reading in detail
